When Aunt Sandra dies three-and-a-half years later, Tallis and Wyatt find themselves moving yet again, this time to New Hampshire to live with their father's sister, Aunt Gabbie, and her husband Noreis. Gabbie is young, pretty and fun. Tallis remembers being a little girl and playing with her aunt at the family home in California, before her parents died. So Tallis is excited to re-locate and reconnect with Gabbie. But what should have been a happy reunion, is plagued with problems when Noreis opens a basement portal between the spirit and human worlds.

Tallis is a practical kid. She doesn't believe that ghosts exist. But, she can't deny what she sees with her own eyes, and the two ghosts she meets at Thanksgiving in the basement of her aunt's house are definitely not figments of her imagination, although she wishes they were. Tallis is unwittingly drawn to the portal's energy when one of the ghosts fixates on her and forces her to assist in the release of three particularly nasty spirits. As a final blow, the portal chooses Tallis

as a temporary gatekeeper and she finds herself charged with the duty of returning the very ghouls she's set free, plus a few of their buddies, back to the spirit realm.

As Tallis learns the secrets of the portal and begins to understand her newly acquired power, she formulates a plan to return the ghosts. 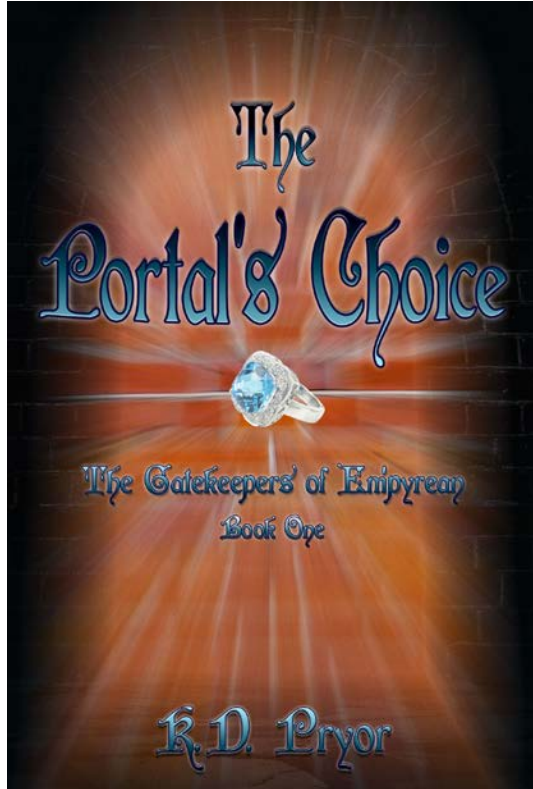

Q & A with Author K.D. Pryor

Q. Tell me about yourself.

A. I am a Midwestern girl who has moved a fair amount. My family now lives in New Hampshire. While I love the beauty of the mountains and the forests, I don't care for snow and cold weather. The best climate I have ever lived in was in Bangalore, India, now Bengaluru. The experience of living overseas was amazing for me, my husband, and our three kids. We experienced such diverse cultures in our daily lives and our travels. We also adopted two cats who came home with us and remain our living souvenirs of our time spent abroad. My dad often asks if the cats speak Kanada, the language of Karnataka state where we lived, or English. I think they have adapted to the American way of life, but they do have a slight accent when they meow.

Q. Give a brief description of your book.

A. The idea for my book was born on a late afternoon in June when I drove by an older house located next to an even older graveyard. For some reason, this sight caught my imagination and I knew that some kind of interaction happened between the basement of that house and the graveyard next door. At home, I brainstormed the initial idea with my husband and kids until I was fairly certain I had a young adult novel about a portal between the spirit realm and our human world. From there, the book took off. Some days, I feel that it wrote itself and I was present only as the typist.

Q. Why did you write this book?

A. I love to write. I've played with the idea of writing a novel for a decade and have two books partially completed. I finished this particular book because the story spoke to me the strongest. I named my protagonist Tallis, which in French is pronounced *Tally* with an accent at the end, on the 'i' sound. Once I had Tallis named, she was my constant companion and as she grew, so did I. It's funny, but I didn't have the book outlined completely and, in fact, many aspects of the story changed as I wrote. Ultimately, I realized that I was going to learn the next part of the story when Tallis learned what she had to do next and I, as the author, simply had to be patient.

Q. What is your professional background?

A. I graduated from Trinity University in San Antonio, Texas, with a degree in International and Comparative Studies. After school, I worked in the banking industry for four years in the Midwest. At that point, I decided to go to law school and attended the University of Kansas in Lawrence, Kansas. During my last semester of law school I discovered that I was pregnant, a

wonderful realization, although it changed my plans a bit. Rather than heading to work right after graduation, I had my son Andrew. Over the next seven years, I had two more children, my daughter Shannon and one more son, Jonathon. I finally realized I wasn't going to practice law. I did earn my certification as a Yoga teacher in India, and spent a good deal of my time in workshops and with my yoga master, learning about the yogic tradition. I think that my years as a mom listening to my kids and their friends, coupled with my experiences with yoga in India and back home in the U.S., informed the writing of this book.

Q. What did you like to read to your kids as they grew up?

A. Andrew is now 20 years old, Shannon is 17, and Jonathon is 13. I loved reading children's books to them when they were small. My husband and I read to them from many different children's books as they were growing. Those days are over now. Happily, all three remain great readers and often can be found lost in a good book.

Q. What do you like the best about your book?

A. I love the essence of courage that pervades the book. I think that Tallis grows in her own self-courage as she faces many challenges, some typical for a teenager, and others quite unexpected.

Q. How did you publish your book?

A. I am very blessed to have worked with Katherine Mariaca-Sullivan at Madaket Lane Publishers to publish *The Portal's Choice*, Book One of *The Gatekeepers of Em'pyrean* series.

Q. What do you hope readers will take away from your book?

A. Again, I think this book is about courage, which, to me, is all about life. I hope my readers take away the realization that everyone has the innate courage to create the life they want. Tallis found her courage despite many obstacles and discovered that what she thought she never wanted was actually the destiny she desired. And she used her courage and the grace that she generated to take command of her life and her situation.

Q. What kinds of books have inspired you over the years?

Growing up, I discovered *Little Women* by Louisa May Alcott. When I was 12, my family visited Boston and my parents took me to her childhood home. That was such a treat. I read *Little Women* over and over again. Talk about a book that examines the concept of courage. I also love Agatha Christie books and am fascinated by the complex puzzles she weaves into her stories. I've always enjoyed a good ghost story and Edith Wharton does those beautifully, as do many

writers from all over the world. I spent many an evening reading the *Harry Potter* series to my children. Again, the complexity of the stories and J.K. Rowling's ability to weave all the plotlines into a coherent whole fills me with wonder and appreciation. Overall, I love a novel that keeps me guessing, that isn't too pat or easy to figure out. I like suspense, some magic or otherworldly aspect, and strong characters.

Q. What vision do you have for your book and where do you want it to take you?

A. I foresee that *The Gatekeepers of Em'pyrean* series will be complete at three trilogies taking the readers and me to many different portals and displaying the courageous actions of three different gatekeepers. Right now, I'm focused on Tallis Challinor and what she is doing in the next book, *The Forgotten Gate*. I enjoy the journey of discovery with Tallis, and I look forward to solving many more ghostly problems with her and the next two gatekeepers.

Q. What appeals to you most about your genre?

A. I love the Young Adult genre because young people have so many options before them and they aren't afraid to explore. So fiction written for young adults can be adventuresome, whimsical, horrific, sweet, unexpected, otherworldly, even fantastic. I can allow my imagination to run wild and know that there will be a young adult audience that will run with me.

Q. Books that gain popularity can often translate into other products. What potential do you see in the future of your book?

A. I think *The Gatekeepers of Em'pyrean* series could easily translate into a series of movies. I also think the books could be wonderful as video games with Tallis and her cohorts working together to return unruly spirits to the Spirit Realm. Since there are many levels to the spirit realm, who knows if those spirits would go to Bancofa, or a level or two above, or would end up in Perditas or Dardanos, the realm of the lost spirits?

Q. On a more personal note, what is your favorite dessert?

A. I absolutely love Crème Brulee, although I must admit that I love chocolate from Switzerland, Germany, Belgium or France almost as much. When my husband and I had been married for about 7 years, we left our oldest son with my parents and took a trip to London. We returned with bars of chocolate from all over Europe. My husband, Jim, isn't nearly the chocolate fanatic that I am. He forgot the chocolate, but I did not. And I ate it. When the day came that Jim wanted a piece of chocolate from our trip, I had to admit that the candy was gone. He's never forgotten. Yet, he still forgets that chocolate isn't safe around me and if he wants some, he'd better get it fast.

Q. Tell me about your ideal day.

A. My ideal day would be waking up to sunshine in a totally new place and exploring my new surroundings. I love to travel, and there is almost no place on earth I wouldn't visit. On my ideal day I would sample the food, meet the people, and take a long walk in the beauty of wherever I happened to be. Some of my favorite places where I have had ideal days include Sydney, Australia, Beziers, France, London, Paris, Saint Briac sur Mer, Brittany, France, and Dunedin, on the South Island of New Zealand. I think my next ideal day should be in South America. I must plan the trip.

Q. Tell me about the best thing to ever happen to you.

A. I've had so many wonderful blessings come into my life, including meeting my husband and having my kids. But the absolute best thing that ever happened to me happened on a July evening when I typed the words "The End" at the end of *The Portal's Choice*. Finishing my first novel was my very own personal act of creation and something about which I am immensely proud.

Q. Please provide a brief bio.

A. I was born in North Kansas City, Missouri but haven't lived in the Midwest in many years. I went to college in Texas and law school in Kansas. My family consists of three kids, one husband and three cats. When I'm not writing, I love to embarrass my kids in cahoots with my husband, ride bikes with my husband when we plan how we'll pester our children, read a wonderful book (there are so many out there), and travel.

Q. What are the titles of your next books?

A. *The Portal's Choice* is the first book in a series of what will be three trilogies. I am working on the second book in *The Gatekeepers of Em'pyrean* series, which is called *The Forgotten Gate*.
